TAWAS CITY BASEBALL CLUB ORGANIZE

At a meeting Tuesday evening, of the local baseball club, M. C. Musolf was again elected as manager. W. C. Roach, Burley Wilson and Charles Moeller were elected as a finance committee for the club this season.

Burley Wilson addressed the club regarding the completion of work already begun at the fair grounds. A brief outline was given on the amount of material it would require to recondition the diamond. Approximately 150 yards of clay and 75 yards of sand would be necessary for the making of a standard baseball diamond. This material could be obtained from the U. S. G. Co. at Alabaster. In speaking of the condition of the field, Mr. Wilson says, "The diamond could be worked into proper condition by June 1, if work was commenced at once." This late date, however, will not conflict with the opening league date, as a schedule will be made accordingly.

A committee was appointed to take up the matter, with the supervisors, of an appropriation to help put the diamond in shape.

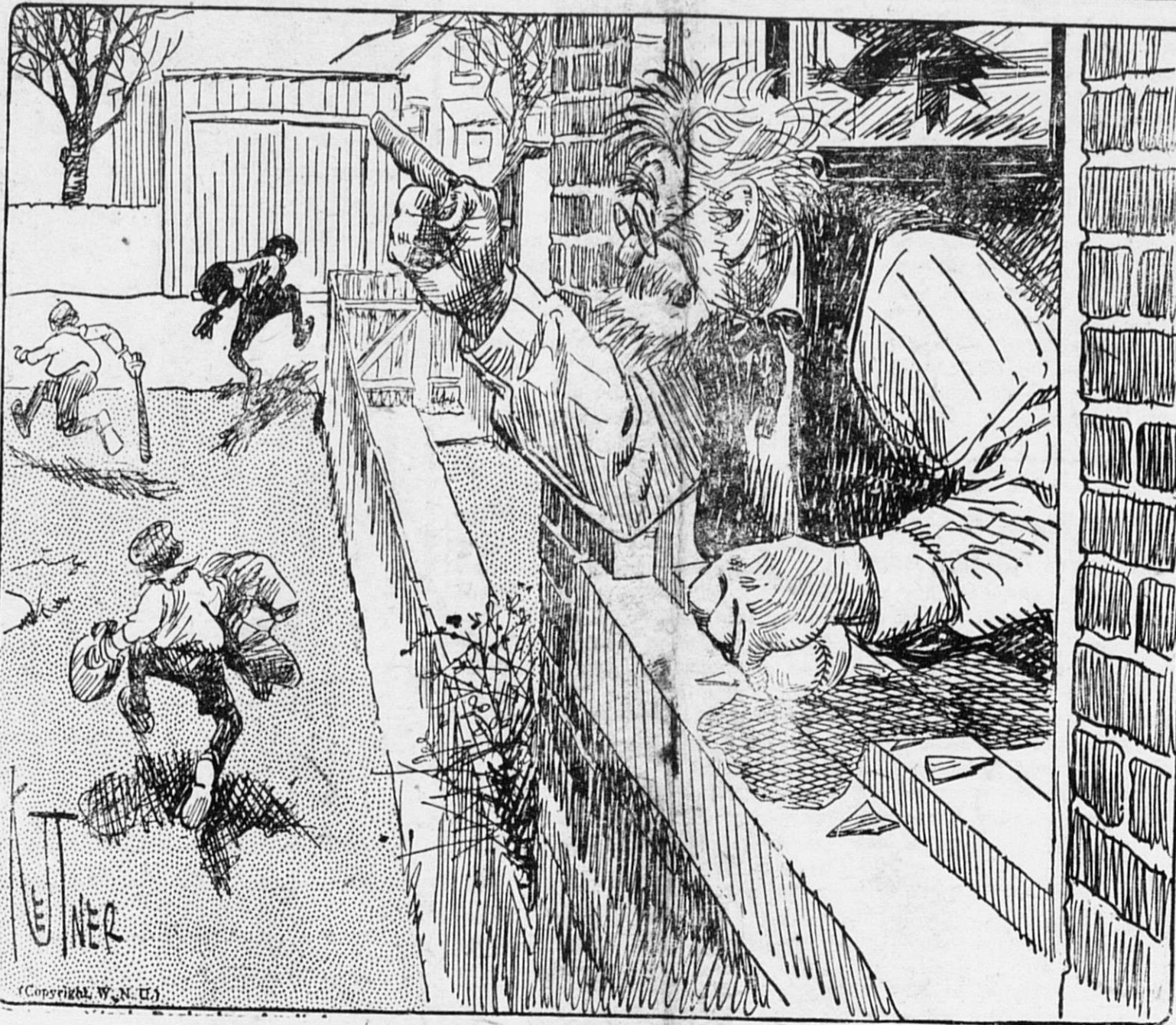

"FAUST" A GREAT FILM: GLAMOR IN EVERY FOOT OF IT

"Faust," glamorous, virile, romantic and tragic, has finally reached the screen, in an UFA production directed by F. W. Murnau, released through Metro-Goldwyn-Mayer, which will be shown at the State Theatre Sunday and Monday. Emil Jannings gives a stirring performance as Mephisto, and Gosta Ekman is a marvel of make-up and character portrayal in the title part, but to Camilla Horn, a screen "find" must go the histrionic honors. She makes of Marguerite a pathetic, lovable girl of human quality, who sins and suffers for love and is redeemed by it when the end comes.

The story of "Faust" is the story of the struggle between the good and the evil in every man, and the temptation that power and riches offers.

Mephisto presumes to rise to heaven, to challenge supremacy of the Lord. Famine, death and pestilence, in the shape of three hideous horsemen, ride the world. But an angel bars the path of the Lord of the underworld.

Orgy follows orgy, till wealth, wine and women pall on Faust. He sees and falls in love with Marguerite. Marguerite's mother dies, she gives birth to a child in the midst of a fearful snowstorm. No one will take her in and the child dies.

SAFETY FIRST MEETING HELD BY U. S. G. CO. EMPLOYEES

Two hundred employees of the U. S. Gypsum Co. attended the Safety meeting held at the Alabaster school auditorium last Monday.

Mr. Jeru, safety director of the plant, opened the meeting and stated the safety ideal of the United States Gypsum Co. which is, "That the workman shall live to enjoy the fruits of his labor; that his mother shall have the comfort of his arm in her age; that his wife shall not be untimely a widow; that his children shall have a father; and that maimed bodies which were once whole shall not be a by-product of industry."

Mr. Jeru remarked that, "The first objective in safety is to save men from injury or death and to save their wives and children from loss and suffering." Such forceful statements cannot help but make men careful while at their daily tasks.

Grant Curtis in a few brief and well chosen remarks stressed the importance of carrying over the campaign enthusiasm beyond the month of May and into each working day of the future.

Supt. L. R. Sanderson told of the recent record made by the local plant, 276 days in which not one loss-of-time accident occurred. Mr. Sanderson also recalled "the golden times" when no guards or safety devices were used. Accidents were few, however, because each man realized the danger he was in, and was on the lookout. In summing up his remarks Supt. Sanderson concentrated on two chief points, first—always expect an accident and keep uppermost in mind the dangerousness of the task, and secondly—this campaign is for you, not the other fellow.

Novel features of this month's campaign are the publication of a daily safety bulletin and the "win a cigar" stunt by discovery of a "safety bug." The practise of blowing three long blasts of the whistle at 3 p. m. signifying 24 hours of no-accidents will be used again during the campaign.

U. S. 23 (M-10) WILL REQUIRE 21,000 YARDS OF GRAVEL

Twenty one thousand yards of gravel or 666 car loads, will be required to condition the east and west detours during the construction work on the pavement of U. S. 23 (M-10) between Standish and Pinconning.

This information given by Johnnie Orr, superintendent of maintenance of the Arenac County road commission, will show how large the proposition of keeping up these detours will be. The cost, \$40,000, plus maintenance, will be borne by the state and federal governments. Mr. Orr now has a big crew on the job working on the old state road south of Pine River. About one mile of this road was completed last fall. Arenac county appropriating \$3,000 for this work; at its fall session in October \$5,000 more was put aside for the improvement of this road. It is a part of the agreement with the state and federal governments that the county continue with its original plan and expend this \$5,000 on the state road. It is on this part of the road that men are now working. Work will continue after the county's share is completed and will meet that portion of the road now traveled up to the Bay-Arenac line. When completed the road will provide this district with a very satisfactory outlet and one that will be appreciated by the farmers of that section of the county.

The north bound traffic on U. S. 23 will be directed over this route up to Pine River, here it will follow the gravel west to the corner at the Pomroy Auto Sales Co. garage, where it will again follow the trunk line.

The west side detour on the "three mile" or Woodville road will carry the south bound traffic which leaves the trunk line at the State Bank of Standish corner, going west three miles to the south detour and getting back on the trunk line at the M-10 route to the present pavement.

The main trunk line will not be closed to traffic until the detours are fully completed. For this reason Mr. Orr is making every possible effort to rush the detour work through to completion. It is expected the detours will be completed in a month to six weeks.—Arenac Independent.
