CYCLONE DOES MUCH DAMAGE FOUR COUNTIES SUFFER LOSS

The windstorm which swept over Michigan Monday afternoon did considerable damage in Iosco county, especially in Plainfield, Reno, Burleigh, Sherman, Grant and Tawas townships. The windstorm was the worst recorded in the history of this section of the state, where winds approaching the velocity of Monday's storm is practically unknown.
In the territory invaded by the storm the wind approached the ferocity of a tornado, leveling silos, and several barns, crashing in windows and doors and doing other damage. There was no loss of life, but many narrow escapes are reported. Two of the barns reported to have been destroyed by the wind are, one located on the Wm. Addy farm in Plainfield and the other on the George Hall farm in Grant township.

Standish, May 10—A windstorm accompanied by heavy rains and in some places, hail, swept through portions of Arenac and Ogemaw counties from 4:40 to 5 o'clock Monday afternoon, completely wrecking 31 barns and damaging other farm buildings. The loss will amount to many thousands of dollars but there were no lives lost and no reports of personal injury have been received.
In Arenac county the heaviest damage was done in the vicinity of Sterling, Maple Ridge and Omer.
Reports from Ogemaw and Gladwin counties indicate that those counties were badly hit by Monday's storm.

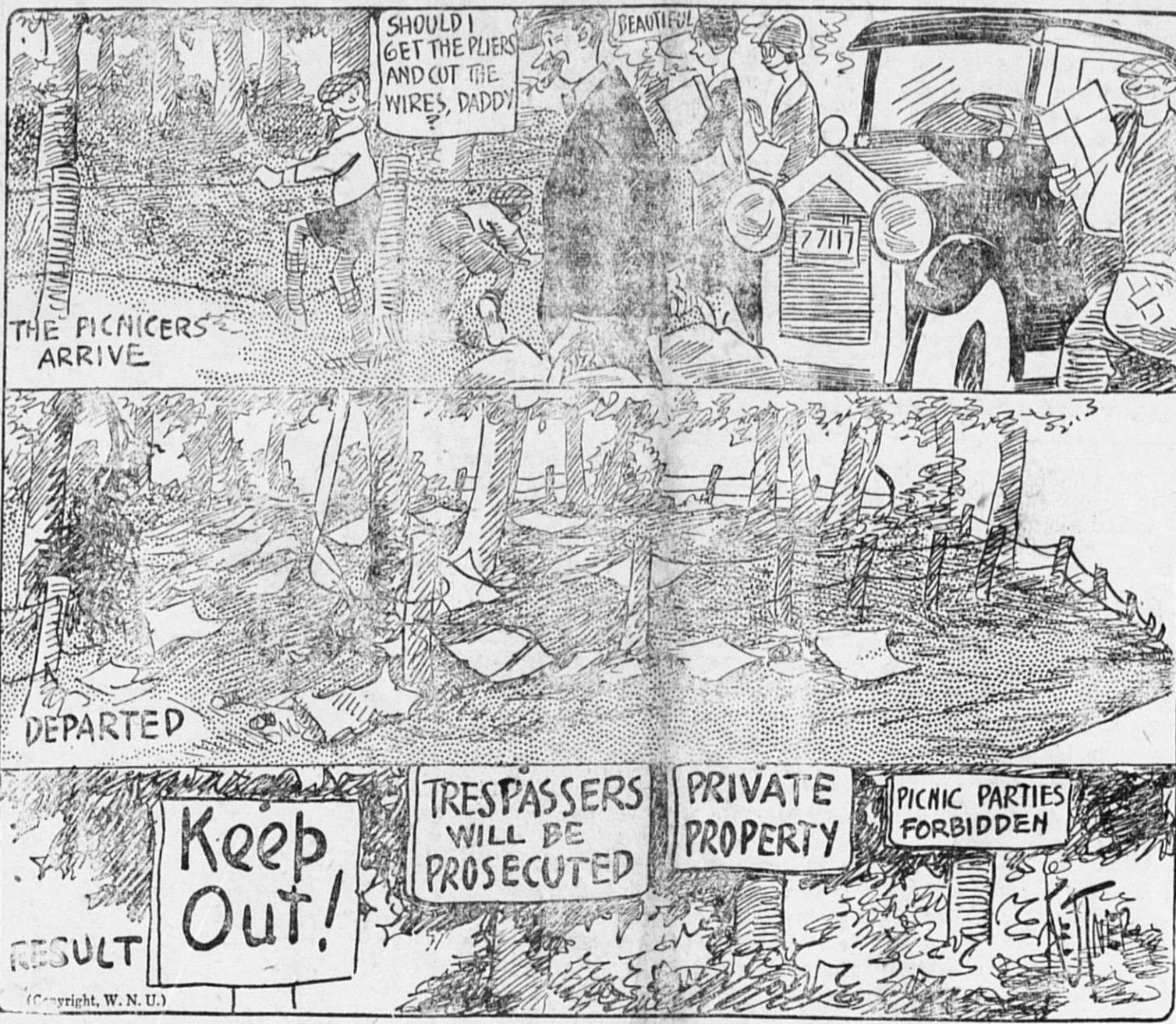
BEAUTY AND DRAMA IN "BARBARA WORTH"

TAX SALE OF IOSCO COUNTY LARGELY ATTENDED

The tax sale held at the County Treasurer's office on May 3 was one of the largest and best attended held in many years. While the total sales did not compare with those of last year because the city of AuSable judgment tax sale alone was over \$40,000 last year, the sale of land in general was much larger, amounting to \$6,500. The largest purchasers were McDonnell Brothers of Flint, who purchased several thousand acres between East Tawas and AuSable and west of the D. & M. Ry. They do not make any statement of what they are planning to do with this land, but consider it a good investment.
These lands have been regarded as the poorest values in the county, but when investors are willing to put several thousand dollars into them it looks as if any land in Iosco County was a pretty good investment. McDonnell Brothers purchases amounted to about \$3,000.

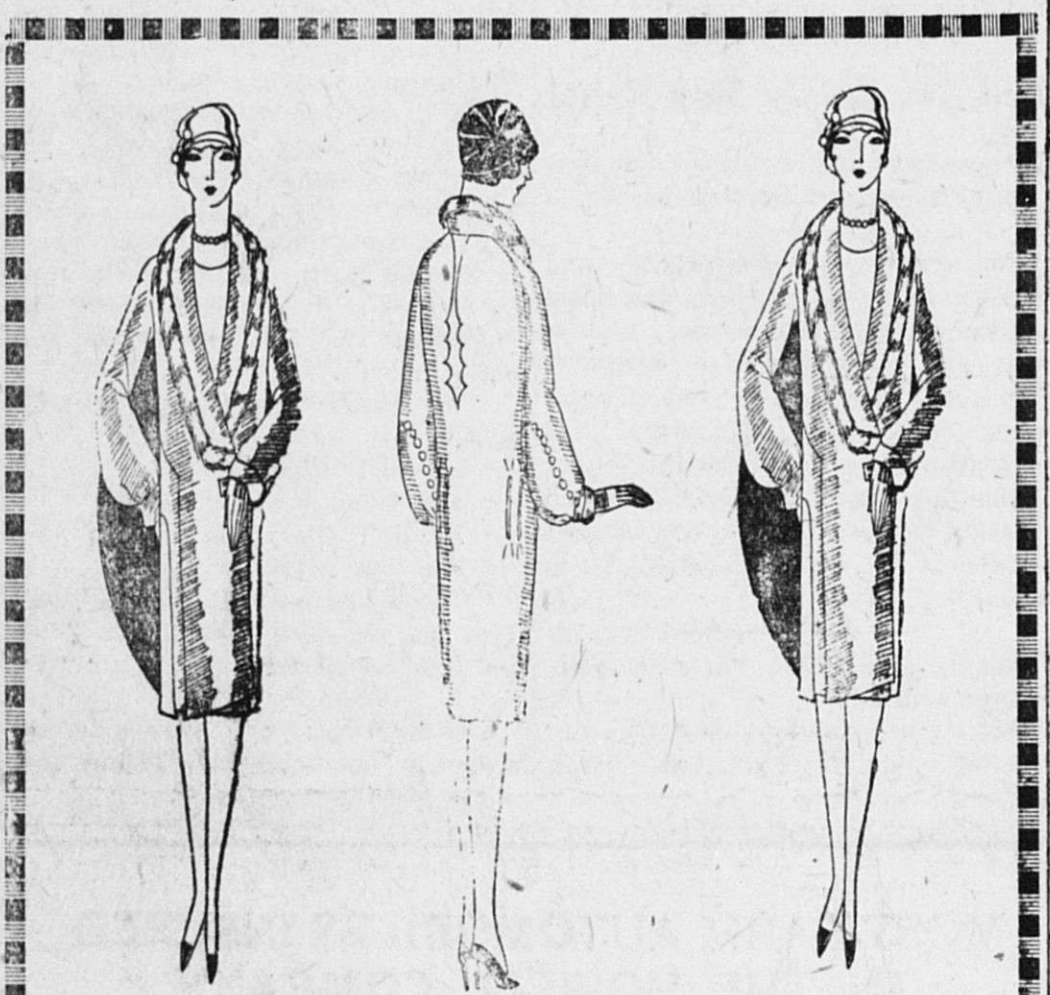
