CITY TO INSTALL NEW BOULEVARD LIGHTING SYSTEM

At the regular meeting of the common council held Monday night it was decided by an unanimous vote to have boulevard lights installed in the business section of Lake street. A petition for this improvement bearing the names of the largest taxpayers had been placed before the council.

On Wednesday, engineers prepared the specification for the new lighting system and the project will be submitted for bids.

The proposed lighting system will extend from Mathews street to First street and will consist of about thirty lights mounted on ornamental iron columns with underground conductors carrying the electric wires. It is estimated that the system will cost \$2,000.00.

The cost of the new lighting system will not be felt to any extent by the taxpayers as a good share of it will be met by a cut in the other expenditures from the general fund.

Since laying the pavement on Lake street such an improvement has been considered by many of the citizens in the city. It will add greatly to the appearance of the street.


