STEPS TAKEN TO COMBAT MENACE: PUPILS VACCINATED

In order that the small pox epidemic, which has broken out in several localities in Michigan, may be successfully combatted here, Mayor Edw. Trudell urges that everyone be vaccinated at once. The pupils of the public schools were vaccinated Wednesday and Thursday and the pupils of St. Joseph's school will be vaccinated Monday. At that time any person wishing to be vaccinated should be present. Several families in a group may be vaccinated at a residence by appointment with health officer, R. C. Pochert, M. D. or anyone by appointment at his office. All children over three years of age will be vaccinated free of charge.

The following warning was sent out by the State health department: Edward Trudell, Mayor Tawas City, Mich.

Dear Sir: You are probably aware of the fact that smallpox is unusually prevalent in Michigan. During the first twenty-four days of May, 151 cases of smallpox have been reported to this department. Each day witnesses smallpox reported from communities which had previously escaped. The disease is spreading. Your community may or may not have had recent cases of smallpox, but in either case the disease exists not far from you and may at any time make its appearance in your community unless you take measures to have a general vaccination campaign immediately.

If smallpox continues to spread, as it is at present, two things are going to happen: People of this state are going to die of confluent or hemorrhagic smallpox. The summer resort business of the state will be ruined.

This letter is an appeal to your community to immediately institute a general vaccination campaign to apply to all persons, both young and old, who have not been successfully vaccinated within the past five years.

The concerted action of the various communities in the state in bringing about general vaccination is the only hope of preventing what may easily become a serious epidemic.

For the protection of the resort business—the second largest industry in the state, as well as the protection of public health, we confidentially expect you to heed this appeal. If concerted action is not obtained, it will probably be necessary for this department to warn prospective tourists through newspaper publicity of the existence of smallpox in various communities, of which your community may be one.

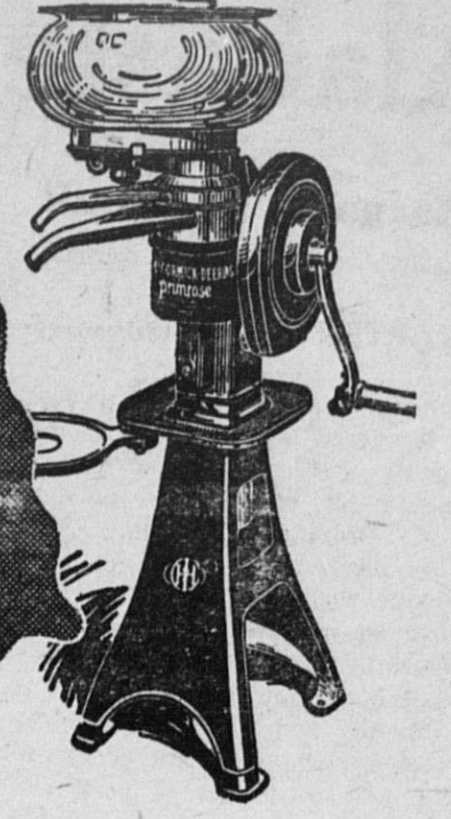

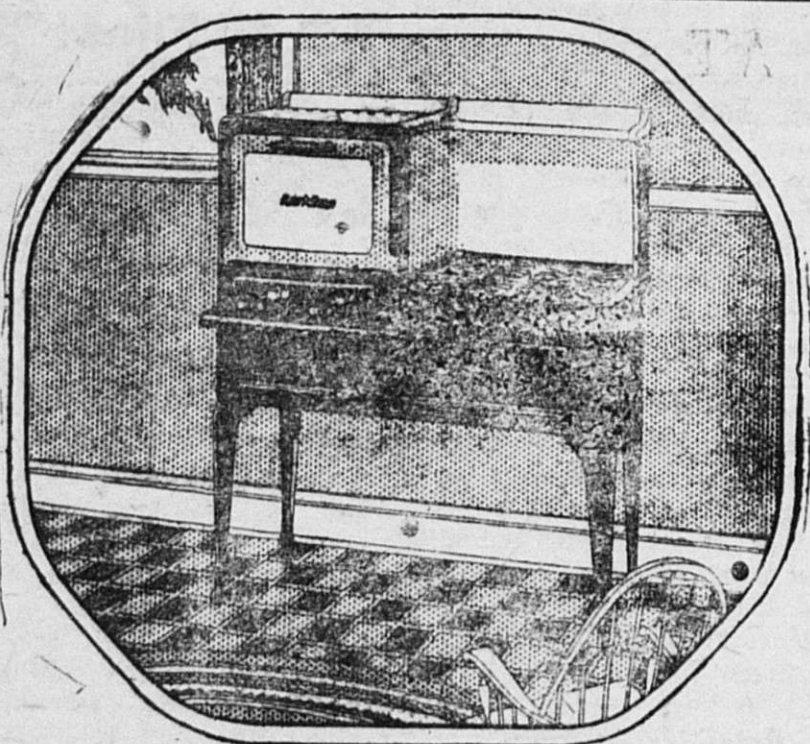

upon each dollar of assessed valua-
tion which amount so raised will be
placed in and constitute the Indebted-
ness fund.

Sec. 2. The foregoing appropria-
tions and provisions are made and re-
quired to defray the expenditures and
liabilities of the corporation of the
city of Tawas City, Michigan for the
ensuing fiscal year, payable from the
several funds heretofore mentioned
and set forth, and it is hereby deter-
mined that the above amounts are
necessary to be raised by levy and to
be assessed upon the tax rolls of the
said city for the year A. D. 1927 and
to be paid into the several funds. The
object and purpose of each of the

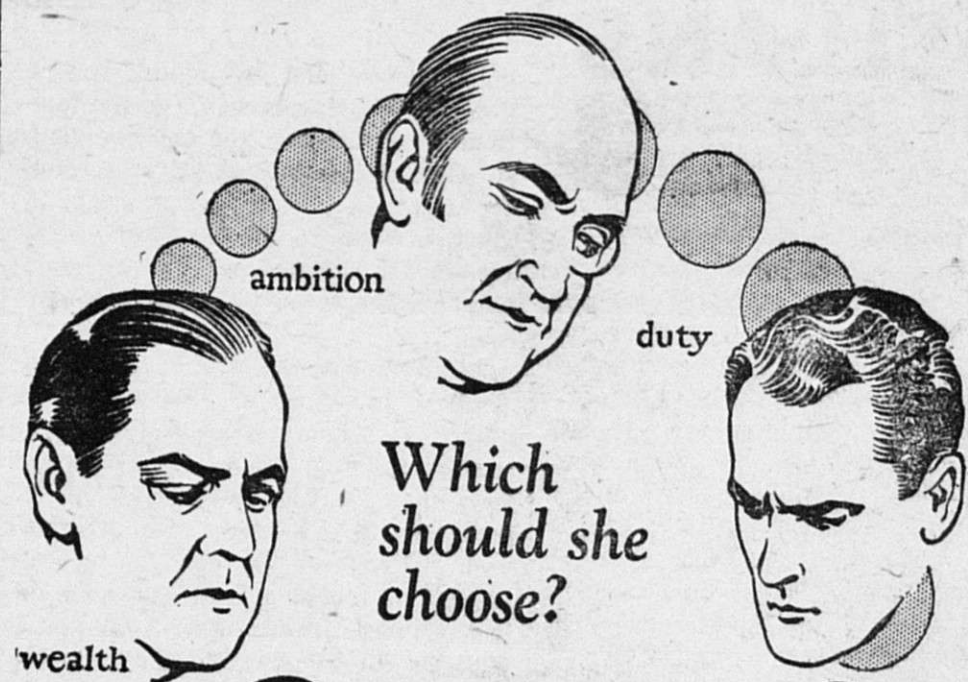
