The Knights of the Ku Klux Klan met July 2, 3 and 4 at Sand Lake for one of the many rallies they plan to have in the state during the present year.

They began to gather early on Saturday afternoon and from 1500 to 2000 Klansmen were registered. During the evening a get "acquainted with your neighbor" meeting took place.

On Sunday services were held in the camp. In the afternoon about 75 cars took part in a sight-seeing tour through the National Forest and to the AuSable river. The evening was taken up with work by a Saginaw degree team. Many spoke highly of the splendid work of the team.

A special feature of the meeting was a parade of Klansmen and Klanswomen in regalia at East Tawas on Monday afternoon. Not many of the local members took part because the K. K. K. is an invisible movement and thus wherever there is a parade the local remain invisible. Several hundred were in demonstration. Music was furnished by two Klan bands.

The principal speakers at the Klonvoication were: G. C. Davey of Detroit and Hon. E. Erstrom of Washington, D. C. There were other speakers from Saginaw and Bay Counties. They were assisted by local invisibles.

The ball game was a real thriller. East Tawas came from behind twice to tie up the score and going into the 9th inning it was tied at 5 all. The Aetnas of Bay City used two pitchers while Joe Halligan went the route for Tawas. The visiting team carried the boys into the 11th inning before they would give in and were finally downed 6 to 5 after two men were out when Joe Noel singled Joe Halligan home from second base. The fielding was very fast with some fancy catches in the outfield.

The barbecue came off as per schedule and under the direction of Dave Bergeron everyone was fed in record time and the large crowd present showed their interest and appreciation of this part of the program.

Throughout the day the Times Tribune band furnished the music at the different places and the Boy Scouts were in charge to keep the crowd in order.

At 8:30 the ground was roped off in back of the water works and the display of fireworks was presented, giving delight to young and old. This was in charge of Rev. Hagle and Mr. Sutcliffe.

The dance at the Community building was very well attended and the Whitney orchestra played throughout the afternoon and evening.

### OSCODA MAN IS SHOT BY BANDIT

Vincent LaLonde, owner of a gas station at Oscoda, was shot and robbed at about five o'clock Sunday afternoon. The wounded man was taken to Mercy hospital, Bay City. His condition had improved when a report was given from the hospital Thursday.

Two men in a car purchased gas at the station and gave a \$20 bill in payment. When LaLonde went to make change for them they shot him once thru the head and twice thru the abdomen. Apparently well acquainted with Mr. LaLonde's customs they located \$250 which he had concealed in the station and taking what money he had in the till, drove away.

Sheriff C. W. Curry and the state police were on the scene within a short time, but a description of the bandits and their car was not available, and while a continuous search is being made no trace of their whereabouts has been found.

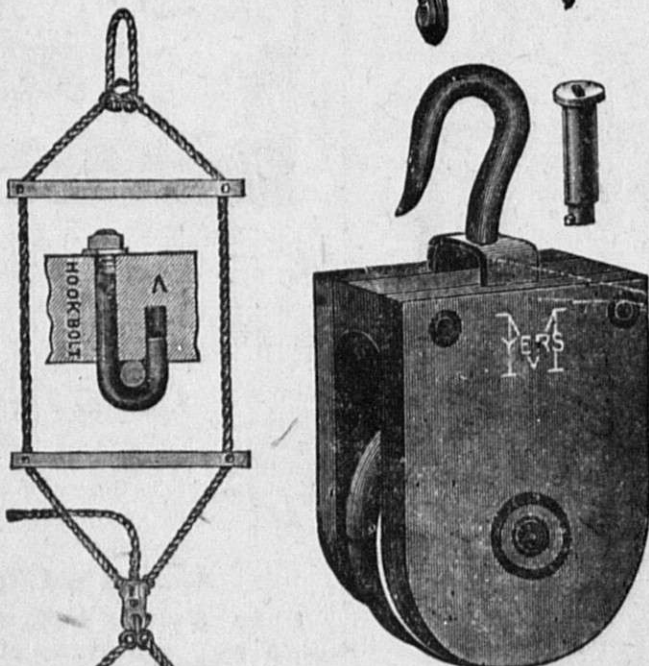

## What Better Railroad Service Has Meant to Business

Agricultural commodities have shown an upward tendency in prices during the current year, while the course of industrial and raw material prices has taken a downward trend. We have been going through a period of price re-adjustments—always a critical time for business—but, in this instance, there were not the usual accompanying shocks to business peculiar to such periods.

The major reason for this absence of disturbances in business is that smaller inventories are being carried nowadays since the railroad service of the country assures certain and speedy delivery. Traders carry smaller stocks, and business, therefore, is carried on with less capital and with fewer hazards.

More stabilized business conditions are assured American business, and with these, consequently, failures become less likely and less frequent.

What the workings of the Federal Reserve Act proves to be to business, through the stabilizing of credits, the improved steam railroad transportation service is accomplishing through its regular and its prompt deliveries. So the large outlays to better the service have justified themselves. Both expedients work to the same end in their respective spheres. They avert the shocks.

In Michigan, this is particularly true. Vast sums, in recent years, have been expended to achieve this new standard of service. Seven of the nine railroads serving Michigan alone are expending this year nearly \$26,000,000 in new engines and cars and in improvements and betterments which will continue these stabilizing forces.

These expenditures, too, were made right at home, and at a time when the lull in industry, through which we have just passed, was at its low ebb. Therefore, these \$26,000,000, going largely to labor, raw materials and manufactured commodities, served appreciably to buoy up conditions.

Michigan railroads have, therefore, been more than local common-carriers. They have, through their service, removed some of the hazards inherent in business in former years.

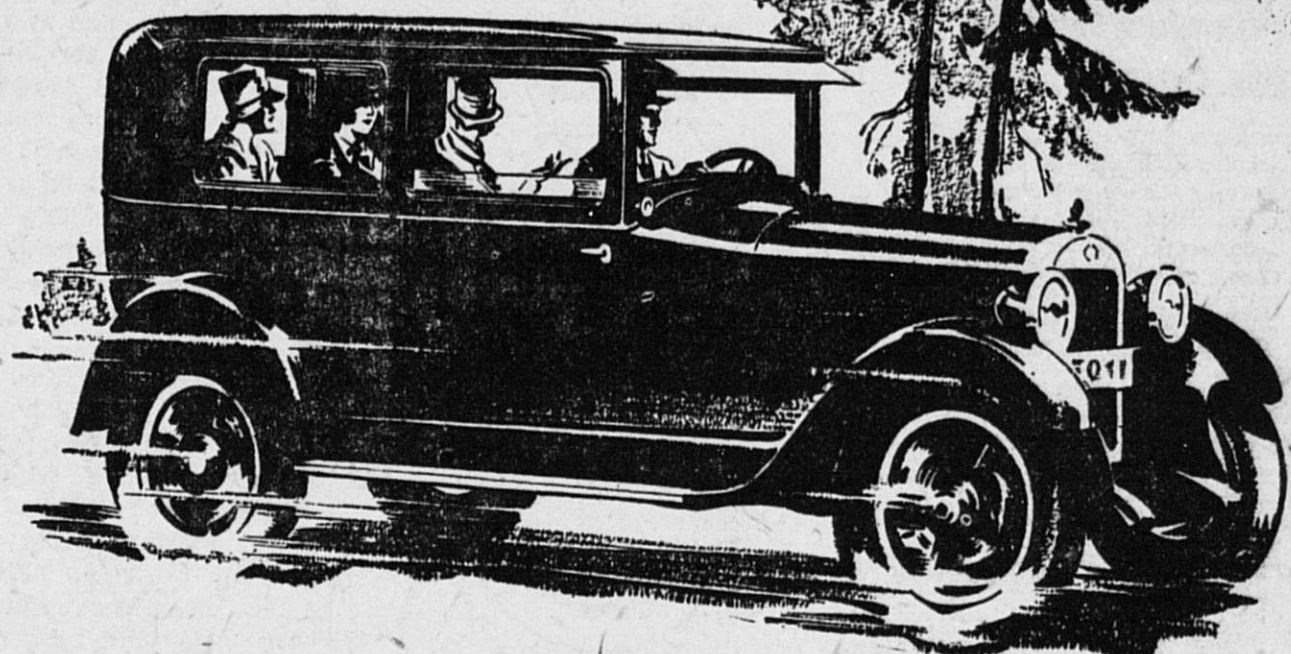
