After making an extended motor trip through Northern Michigan the young couple will make their home in Detroit.

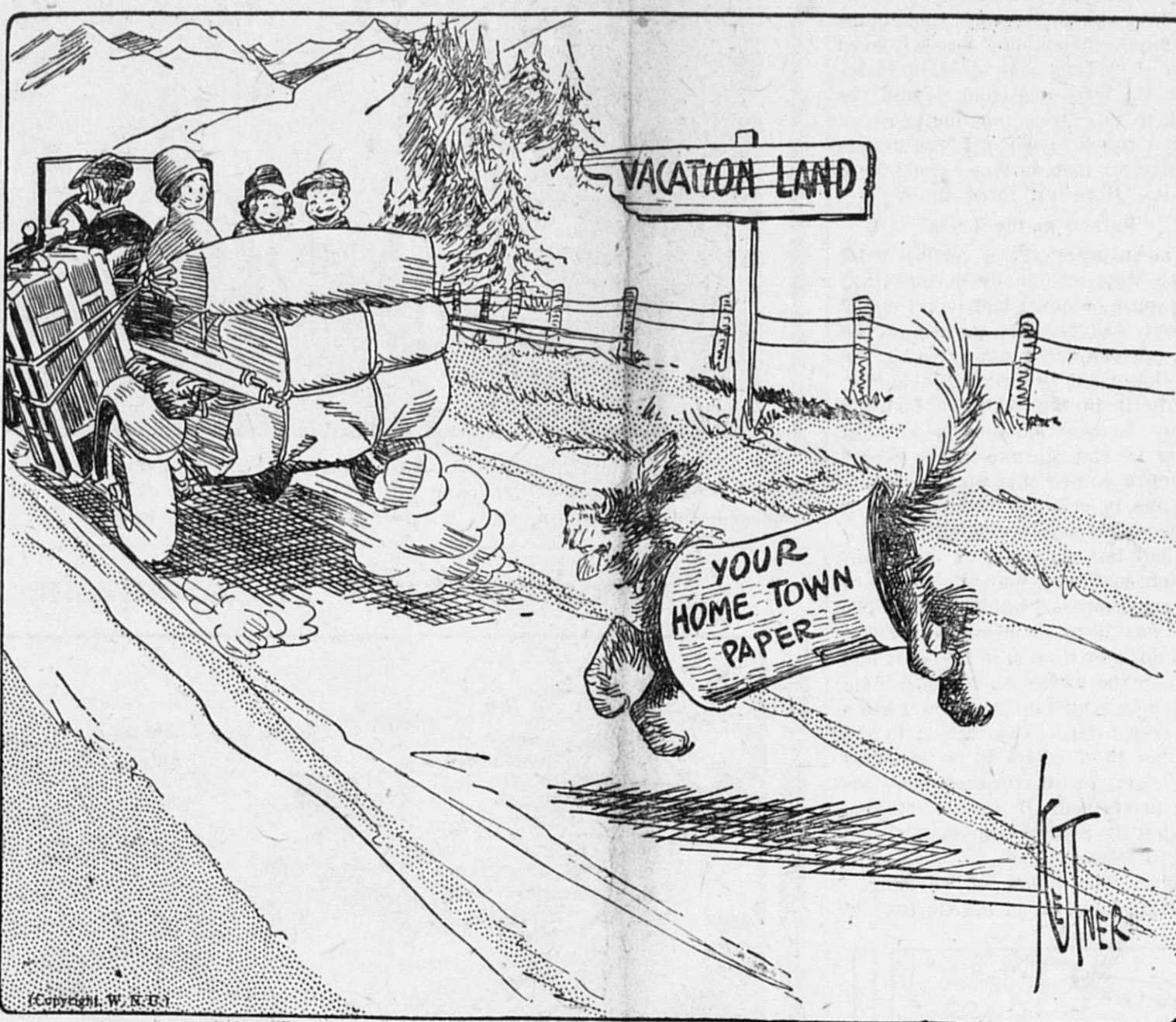
SIXTY-THREE SIGN 1928 CHAUTAUQUA CONTRACT

ROAD MEN DISCUSS HURON SHORE ROAD

On Wednesday, July 13, the Board of County Road Commissioners of Isoco County and the County Engineer drove to Alpena where the state highway officers met with the road commissioners of the four counties bordering Lake Huron to discuss with Frank F. Rogers the construction of a scenic highway from Tawas City to Cheboygan along the shore of Lake Huron. The State Administrative Department authorized a survey of the proposed highway some time ago and we understand that State Highway Department will have surveyors on the job in the near future.

This highway is to run as near the water edge as possible, so that people driving will enjoy the breeze from the lake on hot summer days and to make it as scenic as possible. When completed it will be one of the most beautiful drives in the United States, and we hope the land owners along the shore will co-operate with us in securing the right of way after the State Engineers have worked out a suitable survey of the proposed highway. All of the counties at present are in favor of this road and after the survey is made every person on the eastern side of Michigan should get behind the movement and push until the highway is completed. It will mean hundreds of thousands of dollars to Eastern Michigan in the increase of value in shore property and from tourists trade. We have the finest camping sites at Tawas City and the State Park at East Tawas that are along this ribbon of highway. Oscoda is also excellently fitted and situated to accommodate tourists.

The Arenac County road commission has not decided where the shore highway will be, so nothing was said of the highway south of Tawas City.
