The petitioners contended that assessments on this land were too high in comparison to similarly situated land in other parts of the county.

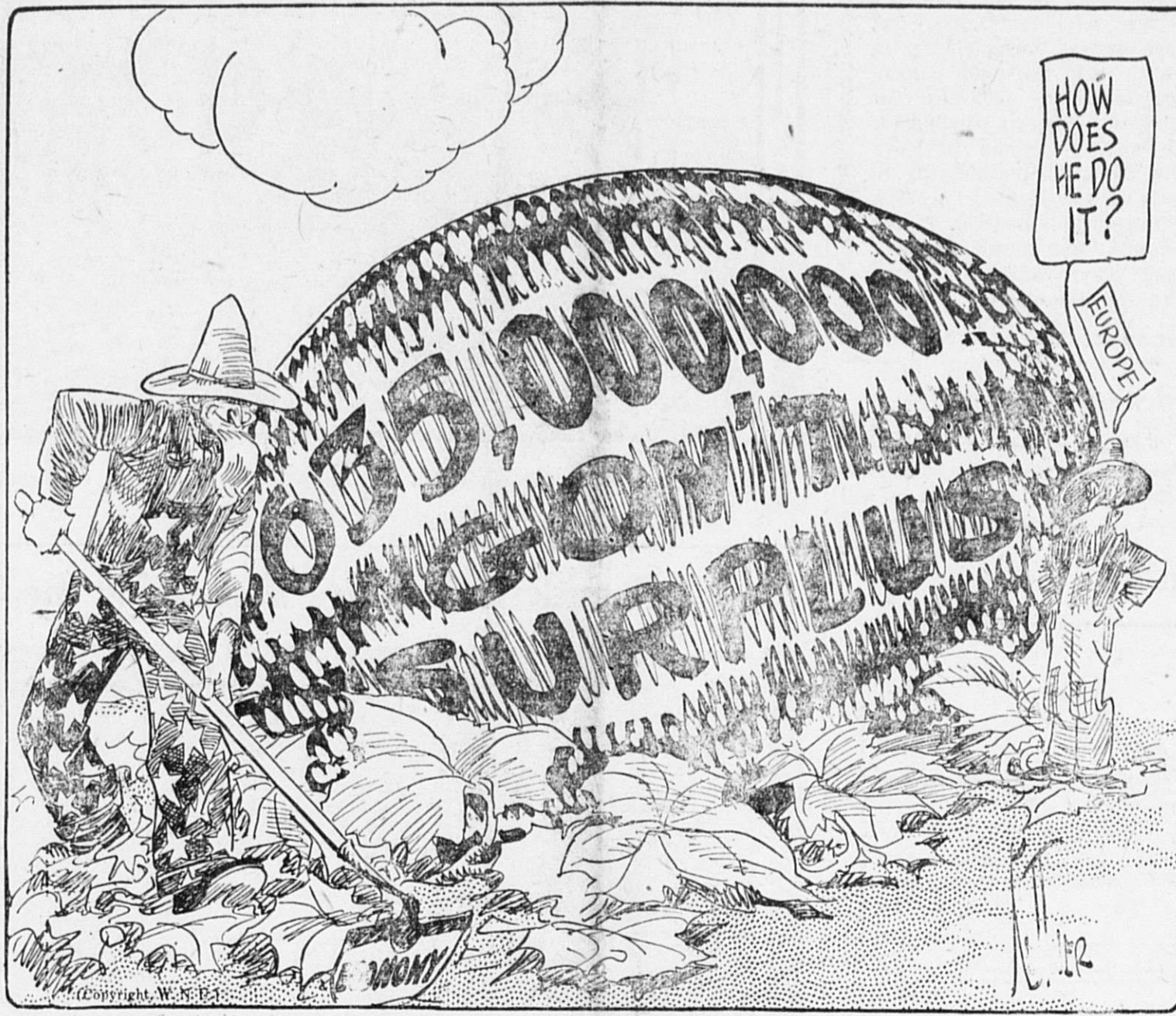

INJURED IN PLASTER CONVEYOR; DIES

John Patterson, an employe of the United States Gypsum company for a number of years and former resident of Tawas City died at 6 o'clock Friday evening, three hours after he had been injured in a plaster conveyor at the plant. The cause of death was shock caused by loss of blood and five compound fractures of the right leg. Mr. Patterson had been attempting to clean a plugged conveyor and stepped into the revolving screw. Workmen armed with an acetylene torch were required to cut the conveyor screw before the injured man could be removed.

John Patterson was born September 9, 1876 at Elkhart, Indiana. He was the son of Mr. and Mrs. James Patterson. The family moved to Tawas City in 1895.

He was married in August, 1911 to Ellen ReBarge of this city. To this union was born a son. They made their home in Tawas City until about four years ago when they moved to Alabaster where the deceased was employed at the time of death.

He is survived by his wife, and son, James besides two brothers, Len J. of Detroit and Orville of Sturgis. Those from out of town who attended the funeral were Len J. Patterson and son, Henry, of Detroit; Margaret Stickney of Council Bluffs, Iowa; Miss Della ReBarge of Detroit and Mrs. Max Mocyte and daughters of Bay City.

The funeral service was held from Evans Funeral parlors, East Tawas Sunday afternoon, July 31. Interment in the Tawas City cemetery.

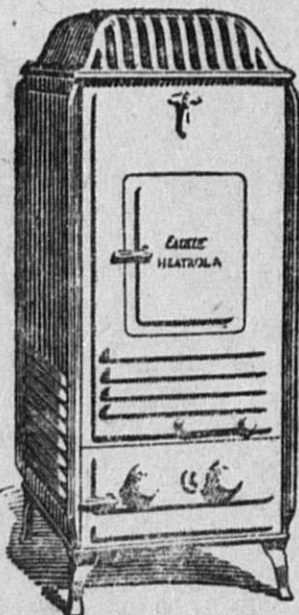
