### MERLE NELEM KILLED; ERNEST SCHREIBER HURT

#### Auto Overtakes Near Glennie Men Were on AuSable River Fishing Trip

Merle Nelem of East Tawas was instantly killed and Ernest Schreiber of Tawas City received serious injuries Saturday evening when their car overturned near Glennie. The accident occurred at about half past eight. The two men were on a fishing trip to Flat Rock on the Au Sable river.

Very little is known of how the accident occurred. They passed a car and arriving at a sharp curve in the road, their car overturned, throwing them out. The car went completely over and righted itself on its wheels.

Sheriff Wilson of Harrisville was called to the scene of the accident. Caius Gordon, who had been at Glennie, identified the two men. A message was sent to Sheriff Chas. W. Curry, who notified the Nelem and Schreiber families of the accident.

The body of Mr. Nelem was taken to Lincoln and brought to his home at East Tawas Sunday morning. Mr. Schreiber was taken to Harrisville. Mrs. Schreiber brought him home Sunday morning. He suffered serious internal injuries and is in a very critical condition, having developed pneumonia. Thursday morning it was thought that his condition had improved. He is under the care of Dr. R. C. Pochert, with a trained nurse in attendance. Dr. Ballard of Bay City was called Monday for consultation.

Merle Nelem was born at Crosswell, Michigan, July 14, 1890 and was the oldest son of Mr. and Mrs. Chas. Nelem. He came with his parents to Tawas in 1892 and spent nearly all the rest of his life in this vicinity. He was educated in the Tawas City Public Schools. He married Miss Ida Hoeft of Rogers City on July 14, 1915.

He leaves his wife and parents, Mr. and Mrs. Chas. Nelem, two brothers, Dudley of this city, Frank of Flint, and two sisters, Helen of Detroit and Rose at home.

Merle was a successful carpenter and contractor, was well known in the county and had many close friends. He was a member of East Tawas Base Ball Club. The pallbearers were all boyhood friends and the flowers were carried by members of the base ball club.

The entire community joins in sympathy with the bereaved family in their loss.

The funeral was held Wednesday afternoon from the East Tawas M. E. Church, Rev. Hagle officiating. Burial in the Tawas City cemetery in the family lot.

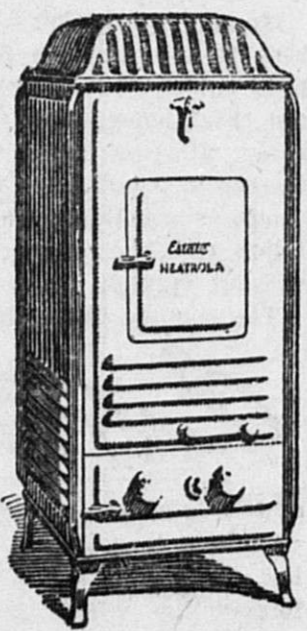

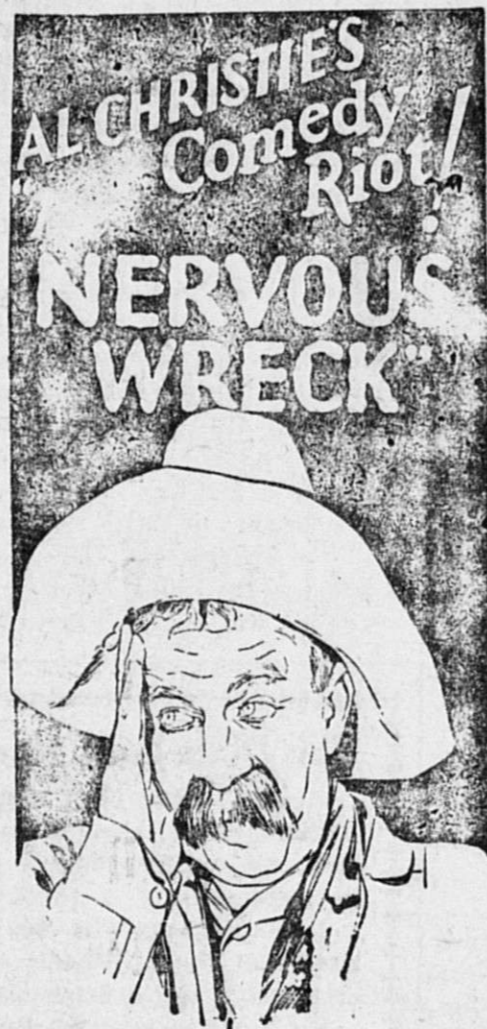
