## BUREAU TO MEET G. A. PRESCOTT DIES TUESDAY

#### Prominent in Business and State Affairs

George Allen Prescott, Sr., died at about one o'clock Tuesday afternoon at his home in this city as the result of a heart attack. Mr. Prescott was 65 years old and had not been in good health for some time.

Returning Monday afternoon from a business trip to Davison, Mich., Mr. Prescott was greatly fatigued. Tuesday morning he felt fine and was very cheerful, but was advised by his physician to remain in bed. With very little warning the attack came at one o'clock Tuesday afternoon and death came instantly, a great shock to his family and his many friends and associates in this city and

throughout the state and nation. George Allen Prescott was born at Reynoldsville, Pa., March 1, 1862. He was the son of Charles H. Prescott, pioneer lumberman and businessman of this city. Mr. Prescott came here when 19 years of age and took an active part in the extensive lumbering and mercantile operations of his father. He was united in mar riage January 18, 1883, to Miss Effie Test, who, with the two sons, George A. Prescott; Jr., and Charles T. Prescott; three brothers, Charles H.
