

He held the office of postmaster for eight years, being appointed by President Wilson. He had been a resident of East Tawas for the Hemlock Road, who presents the 53 years. In the death of Mr. La-Berge, East Tawas loses one of its most highly esteemed and beloved citizens.

James LaBerge was born July 22, 1852, at Beaudarnais, P. Q., and was united in marriage to Mary Jane St. Martin, June 3, 1878, at East Tawas. There are five daughters, Mrs. John McInerney of Alpena, Mrs. Charles Wesendorf and Mrs. David Bergeron of East Tawas, Mrs. James Hughes of Saginaw and Mrs. Eugene Lange of Detroit; and three sons, Roual La-Berge of East Tawas, Roy LaBerge of Detroit and Harry LaBerge of Yakima, Wash., who, with the bereaved wife, mourn his death.

Besides having held the office of postmaster, Mr. LaBerge was mayor of East Tawas for eight years, for four years treasurer of Baldwin township, had been a member of the Board of Supervisors and for four years was collector of customs, during the Cleveland administration, and was identified with every movement for the welfare of the city and county. He was especially active and instrumental in getting temporary relief to the people of AuSable and Oscoda during the fire of 1911. He was a fourth degree member of the Knights of Columbus, Alpena will council and a member of the Knights of St. John.
