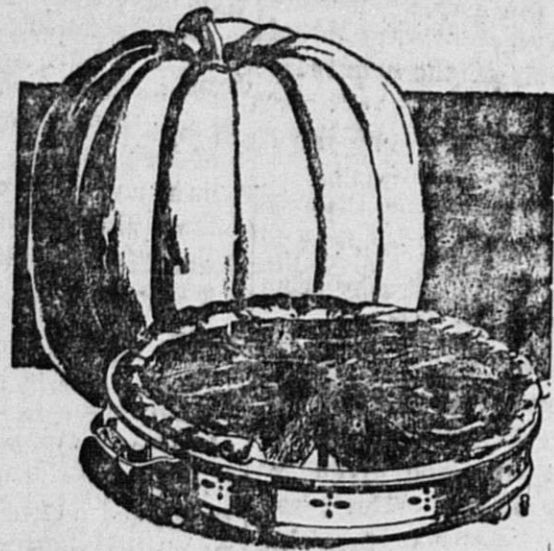

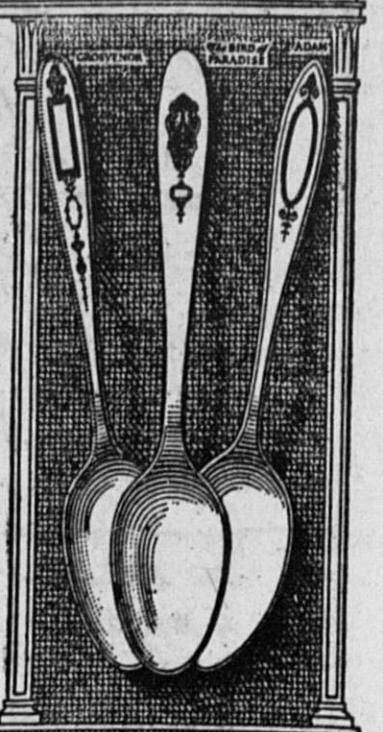

Several of our pupils are still absent with colds. We hope they will soon be back.

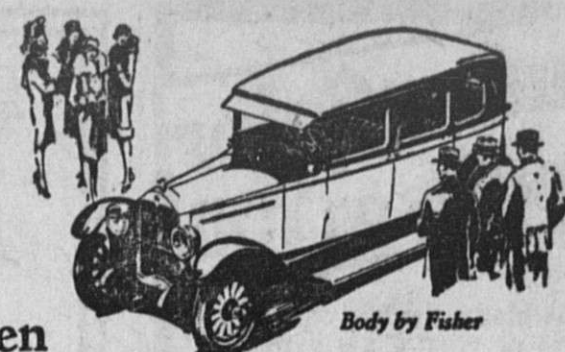
The second grade language is working out a Pilgrim scene in the sand table.

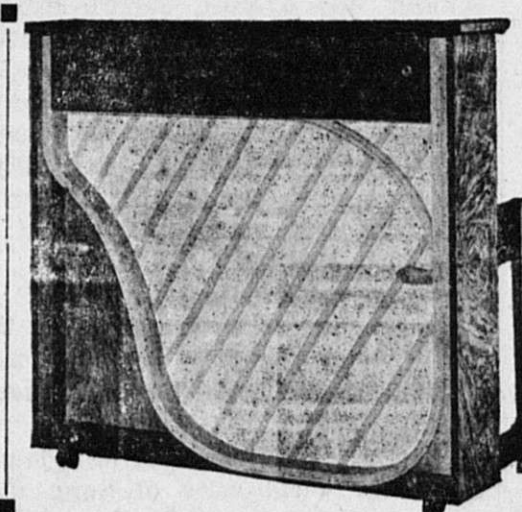

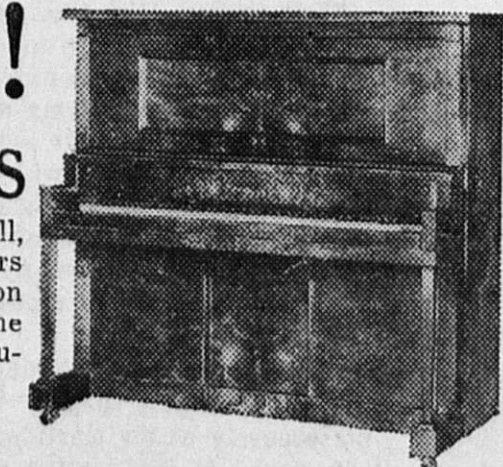
