URGES BETTER TOURIST ENTERTAINMENT

Two years of sea lamprey research and investigation by the conservation department has uncovered some information about the parasite's life cycle and spawning movements, but little so far which can be translated into an effective means of controlling the growing menace to Great Lakes food fishes and game fish in Michigan inland lakes and streams.

The department's institute for fisheries research has verified the presence of migrating or spawning sea lampreys in 108 Michigan streams. The existence of spawning runs also has been demonstrated in every major Michigan watershed in the Lake Michigan basin and in every major watershed north of Saginaw Bay in the Lake Huron basin. Indicating the growing traveling range of the parasitic menace, the institute reports spawning spent or migrating sea lampreys now have been recovered or observed in several Lake Superior tributaries. The species is established in Burt and Mullet lakes as well as several other inland lakes.

Institute research shows there are two essential physical requirements for successful sea lamprey spawning, besides suitable water temperatures of 50 degrees or slightly higher. Needed are the presence of at least some small gravel and a current passing over the nesting site.

The female lamprey spawns from 24,000 to 107,000 eggs with the average size lamprey (17.4 inches) producing an average of 62,500 eggs.

Following entrance into a lake a developed lamprey remains in the active feeding, parasitic stage, sucking the blood out of fishes to which it attaches itself, for approximately 17 months.

From these studies, the institute concludes that the life cycle of the lamprey ranges from five and one-half to six and one half years duration.

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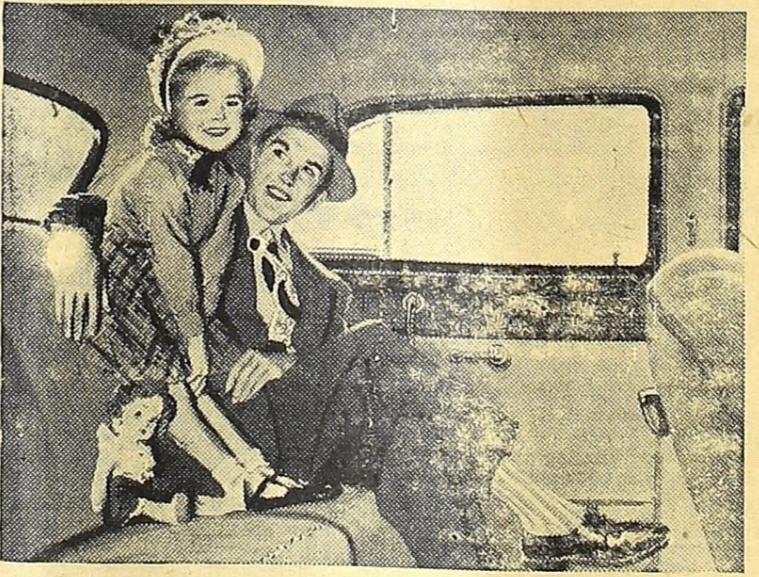

'Rolling Stones' Sure of Getting Mail at Lew's

SEATTLE, WASH. — The only privately owned and operated post office in the United States began its 40th year on Seattle's 3rd av. with more than 700 seafarers and rolling stones of every profession on its rolls.

The proprietor, Lew Charlson, a retired contractor, isn't exactly competing with the United States post office. He uses United States stamps and gets three deliveries a day from a standard mailman in his cubicle lined office at the back end of Raymer's old bookstore.

"It's a post office with a personal touch," Charlson says.

The forwarding mail service for travelers was started in 1909 by Charles Raymer, who up to that time had made a good thing of selling books on prospecting to miners bound for Alaska and manuals on fancy rope work to sailors on shore leave.

Work Became Sideline
A friend stopped in at the store one day to ask Raymer to handle his mail while he was in Alaska during the salmon season. The word was passed along and Raymer was soon licking stamps by the gross, with book selling coming in as a sideline.

Lew Charlson bought the bookstore and post office from Raymer's heirs and put his wife in charge of the book department. With the old rate of \$3 per box per year, Charlson says he's not getting rich fast, but he maintains that there is a certain fascination in figuring postal rates to far away places. Among other remote spots, he now has customers holed up in Wee Waa, New South Wales, Medina, Saudi Arabia and Santiago, Chile.

If a box holder doesn't send in a forwarding address for a year or so, Charlson piles the overflow accumulation in the basement. He has learned from experience not to give up any of his customers for dead.

Lost Two Got Mail

A few months after V-J day, three seamen who had been listed as missing in action by the maritime service showed up to claim their mail and got it. The trio had been in a Japanese prison camp for most of the war.

Some customers have held the same box for over 35 years, but box 13 changes hands every few months, Charlson says.

Forwarding addresses are kept in strict confidence according to postal regulations, but Charlson admits sadly that the rule has ended many a romance.

"Girls come in here quite a bit to find out where their sailors have gone. All I can do is tell them to write him a letter in care of the wanderers' mail service."

After observing the trend back over the years, Charlson concludes that "more and more people are going farther and farther away from home today."

Railroad Stops Big Train To Give Cat to Young Girl

OXFORD, LA. — A railroad stopped its passenger train at this little Louisiana town to give a girl a tomcat. The girl had baked a cake for the railroad.

The cat went to 13-year-old Marlene Wendt, replacing one which was killed by a Texas & Pacific locomotive.

The presentation was made by the engineer of the train which ran over Marlene's dead pet. Other railroaders were present.

Marlene invited the railroad men to the store owned by her father, W. H. Wendt, to try a cake with chocolate icing she had baked.

"I like the cat," said Marlene. "He looks just like Cinder, my other cat. I'm going to name him T&P."

The girl wrote the Texas & Pacific railroad saying:

"Dear sir: My cat was killed by one of your engines. He was a black cat named Cinder. I would appreciate another cat."

The railroad thought that one over a few days.

"In the near future we will see that you have a cat to replace Cinder," the line wrote to Marlene.

Employees of the railroad scurried around to find a cat to suit Marlene. "Cinder didn't have any white whatsoever," she had said in a second letter. "Cinder was a big pet. I mean you could pick him up any time and pet him."

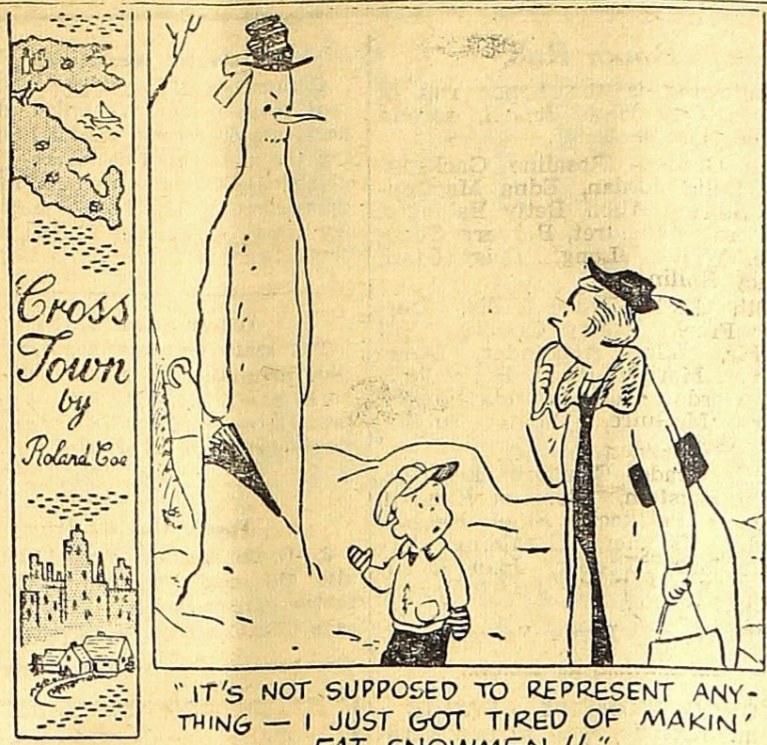
The railroad finally found a suitable animal and arranged for a train to stop here for presentation ceremonies.

Keep Worries to Yourself; They're Catching, Says Doc

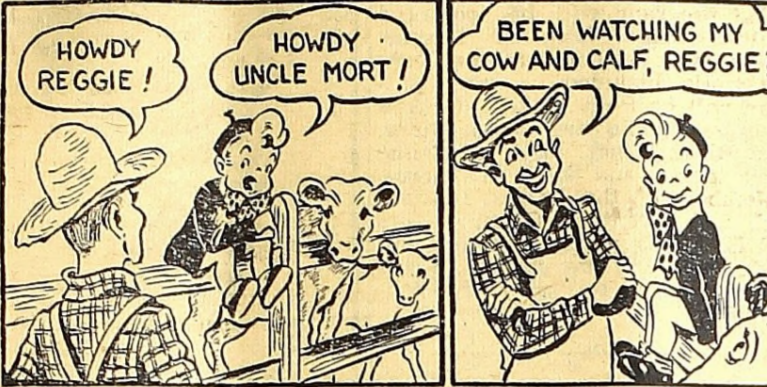

"That," he added, "is one of the reasons why we so readily succumb to war propaganda."



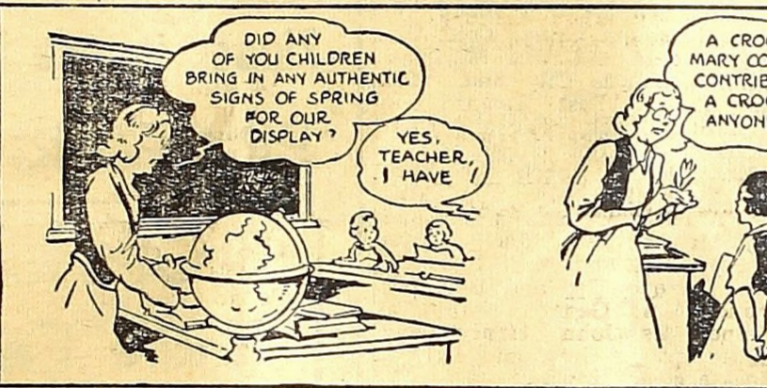
