Tawas City Downed by Alabaster

Prescott Will Play Here Next Sunday Afternoon

The on-again, off-again Tawas City baseball team, in a complete reversal of form, went down before their old nemesis, Alabaster, last Sunday, 9 to 2. This gives the Tawas team a won and lost record of three league wins and five losses.

Felsing, on the mound for Alabaster, pitched a masterful two hit game, striking out six Tawas batsmen and allowing no base on balls. Except for one bad inning, in which his team-mates committed all five of the Alabaster errors, would have had a shut out. Though the Tawas bats were hitting the ball well, the pellet was always right at someone or else the White City men managed to get in front of it.

Rollin, Tawas pitcher, fared none to well in this start, and his backing up was on the shaky side, with errors and passed balls helping to swell the Alabaster run column. He struck out five and walked two.

Two Tawas City players were forced to leave the game via the injury route. In the fifth Dale Landon was taken out when he aggravated a hand injury and was unable to grip a bat and Harold Bublitz was forced out when a batted ball struck him in the instep, in the fifth inning. Case took over behind the plate and Westcott right field.

One of the outstanding plays of the game came in the eighth inning when Libka, in right field made a diving shoe string catch of Pat DeLosh's liner to rob him of his third hit.

Joe Martin, Alabaster second baseman held a field day, getting four singles in five times at bat and scoring twice.

Don Gingerich gave the fans a thrill the first time up, when he blasted a long drive that just curved foul as it left the ball park, missing a homer by inches. Don in his first year as regular, and second year with the club is batting well over .300 and has treated all pitchers with equal indifference, getting at least one hit in every game this year.

This Sunday, Bob McPherson will bring his high flying second place Prescott Club to Tawas City. The last game proved a thriller, in which Prescott nosed out Tawas City 6 to 5. Why not come out and witness these two teams battle it out.

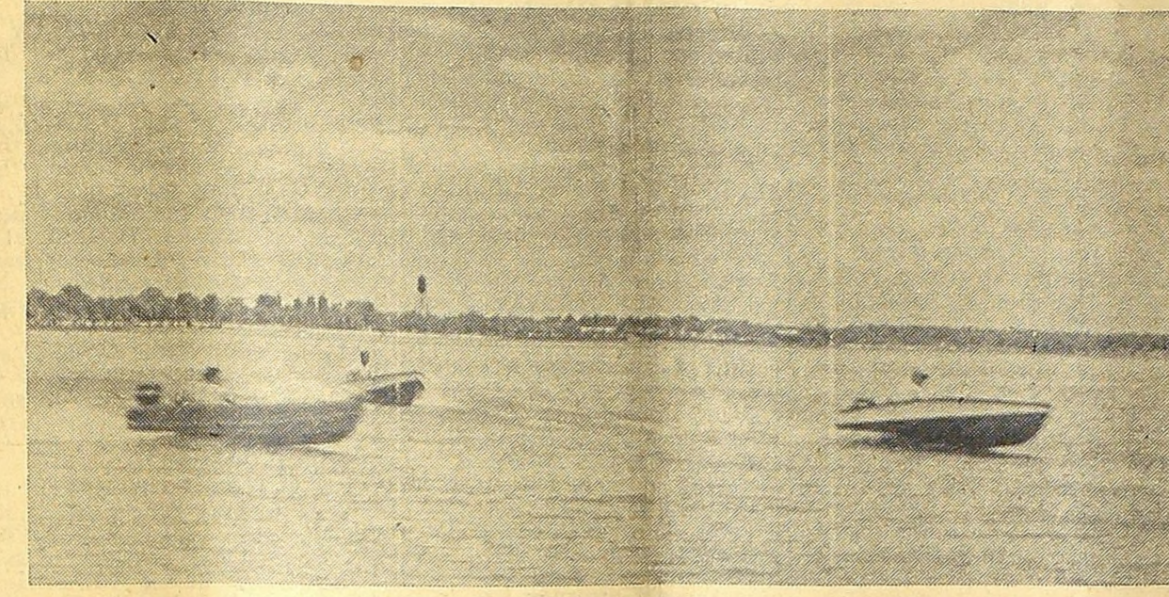

SPRAY NOW FOR APPLE MAGGOT
Between now and July 18, is the time to spray for control of the apple maggot. Use two pounds of Arsenate of Lead to 100 gallons of water. Or two tablespoons to one gallon of water. Repeating the application in two weeks. Gives excellent control.
OR, use two pounds of Wettable DDT to 100 gallons of water or two tablespoons to one gallon of water. Repeat in seven days.
All windfalls should be picked up and fed to hogs or buried at least one foot in the ground.

Born August 24, 1874, at Caseville, Michigan, he was 75 years of age and had resided in this community for more than 50 years. In addition to serving as conservation officer for a number of years, he had been a lumberman and farmer.

Y., Mrs. Phyllis Strayer of Fenton; 16 grandchildren and six great grandchildren.

Mr. Martindale was a member of the East Tawas Methodist church.

Funeral services will be held at 2:00 o'clock Saturday afternoon from the Moffatt Funeral Home. Rev. Harold G. Aushury will officiate. Interment will be in the Greenwood Cemetery.

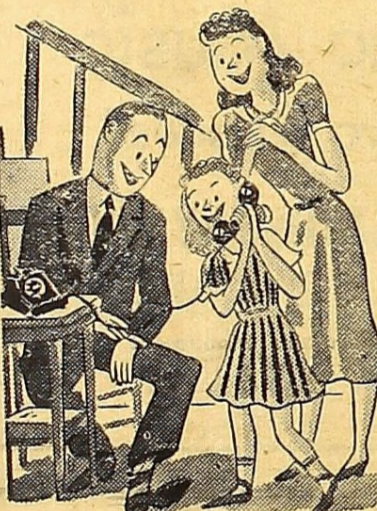

TIME NEEDS CAN BE DETERMINED BY EASY TESTS

Plenty of time is needed for lime to take effect, so plan early for your lime needs advises James A. Porter, extension soils specialist at Michigan State College.

Spreading liming material on wheat ground before planting gives it time to act before sowing legumes next spring, he states. Another bit of advice is to be sure about the lime needs. Testng will give the facts.

If you get your own testing kit from the county agricultural agent, it is possible to test the soil for lime needs in a dozen places in an hour or two. Soil samples can also be taken from five or six characteristic locations in the field and sent to the county agricultural agent or the Soil Science Department, Michigan State College, East Lansing. Tests will be made of the lime needs.

Michigan Rates First In Number of Cattle

Breeding Groups
Michigan ranks first in the number of artificial breeding associations for dairy cattle and eighth in total number of cows bred artificially, a recent U. S. Department of Agriculture report shows.

On January 1, 1949, Michigan had 133 associations, 29 more than Minnesota, its nearest rival. In number of cows bred during 1948, however, Michigan ranked eighth with 120,000. Wisconsin led with 420,000 cows serviced artificially.

Every state in the United States now has an artificial insemination program for dairy cattle and nearly 2,500,000 cows are in herds to be serviced.

O. E. Reed, chief of the bureau of dairy of U. S. D. A., recently pointed to the Michigan program as an example of what artificial breeding can do to spread good inheritance to a large number of cows. The former MSC dairy department herd cited that 12% of Michigan's dairy cattle are now being bred artificially.

Figures of the Michigan Artificial Breeders Cooperative at Michigan State College, East Lansing, show that 40% of the dairy cows in Ingham county are bred artificially. In far away Emmett county, at the top of the lower peninsula, only 2% are bred artificially.

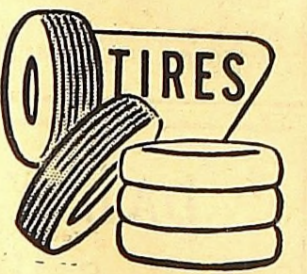

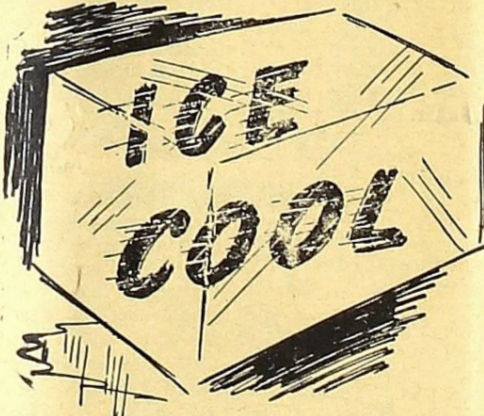

Again we desire to express our sincere appreciation to the supervisors and township officers for their wholehearted cooperation in snow removal. The fact that the townships were with us, has assisted us much more than shows in the financial aid given us.

We feel proud of the work done under the handicaps of insufficient funds and the necessity of operating without the benefit of local gravel. We are not unmindful of the fact that each year the gravel on many of our main roads is gradually approaching the zero mark. Best estimates are that weather and even light traffic put the annual loss at 1/2 inch per year. This loss has been accumulating for years and greatly accelerated by truck and resort traffic.

Most of the grades on our main roads should be rebuilt and raised with deeper ditches constructed to the interest of economy of road maintenance. It is our hope that the Legislature will provide an increase in our revenues to the extent that our roads may annually show some improvement; rather than gradual deterioration. In 1948 we purchased three new two to three ton trucks and one new pickup. Also a gas tank delivery of gasoline. Although only \$4715.57 was paid on this new equipment and the balance given in notes due in 1949, we did pay \$17,448.01 on other equipment notes and interest due in 1948. We have notes on equipment that fall due in 1949, on which the principal and interest will total approximately \$21,000. Also notes due on gravel total approximately \$5000; also \$6700 due on culvert pipe.

We have advertised and hope to purchase a new shovel for our stone quarry. As yet we do not know how we will arrange the financing as the bank has now all the credit permitted by the state. The McIvor bridge is to be built by contract this spring and summer. Our half of the cost of this structure was paid in 1948.

The funds available for maintenance and improvement of roads in 1948 were approximately as follows: McNitt & Horton Money \$150,772.57 Supervisor's Appropriation 7,469.76 Balance of Loan Money 23,150.00 Federal Forest Reserve 929.80 State Maintenance Profit 17,000.00

Total 199,322.13 In spite of figures shown in receipts on the following pages, taken from our books, or \$309,491.18, the above listed items totaling \$199,322.13 represents approximately all that was available to us for expenditures in 1948.

The following are some of the reasons for this big difference in actual available money and book figures: The law requires that the money received from the State Highway Department, in payment for State maintenance, be listed as receipts. A large portion of this money is in payment for work done by the Road Commission, or a return of the money the Road Commission already had received as receipts. As a matter of fact, only the profit on State Maintenance should be shown as receipts if these receipts are to represent

what the Commission has to spend. Also \$18,132.87 of Horton Funds, received from the State for incorporated cities, is included in receipts which is not our money. Likewise receipts listed for chloride and culvert pipe sold, is money returned to us that has already been included in receipts. Also the amount on hand January 1st is set off by the necessity of having the same amount on hand the following January 1st, in order to get through the winter. The item of accounts receivable includes two months back pay for State maintenance. This is off set by the fact that we seldom receive pay for maintenance of State Trunk Lines until two months after the work is done.

Therefore \$199,322.13 is very close to the amount of our total receipts for 1948, rather than the misleading statement showing a total of \$309,491.18, even though the latter is correct according to state bookkeeping regulations.

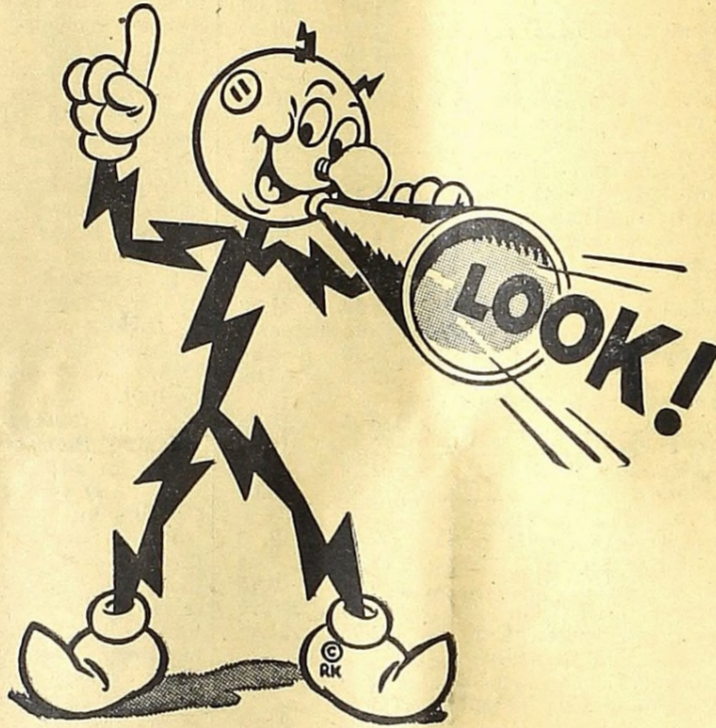

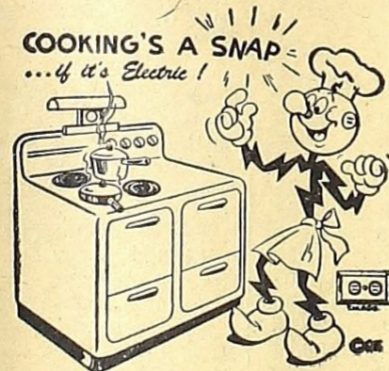
